Traditionally, monsoon season in south Asia is happily anticipated as it signals the onset of cooler weather. Now, climate change has turned that excitement into dread for many in Bangladesh. The country is often referred to as ground zero for the effects of global warming.



Delivering Emergency Relief to Families in Bangladesh

their banks, resulting in severe flooding downstream in Bangladesh's greater Sylhet district. Entire towns were submerged, an estimated 7.2 million people were affected by this disaster.

Mercy-USA for Aid and Development rushed to the affected area with emergency supplies that included food, nutrition biscuits for babies, water purification tablets, hygiene products, first aid essentials, flashlights, candles, and more.



Fresh Meat Brings Urgently Needed Nutrition

Each year, Mercy-USA distributes freshly slaughtered meat in observance of Eid al-Adha. This year, the meat we distributed was even more urgently needed and gratefully received. The war in Ukraine has had a devastating affect on food supplies in many of the countries and regions where Mercy-USA works. For example, Lebanon, Yemen, and East Africa (Kenya, Somalia and Ethiopia) all rely heavily on imports from Ukraine. This year, we distributed fresh meat to vulnerable households in 11 countries, including the United States.













Record setting rain created devastating floods that ripped through eastern Kentucky in late July, 2022. Tens of thousands were evacuated from their homes, leaving thousands homeless for months or years to come. According to the National Weather Service, damage estimates are around \$400,000,000. The floods left behind mud and water that climbed as high as the ceilings in many homes. Houses are traditionally built on tall foundations in this part of rural Kentucky, but even a ten foot foundation was no match for flood waters that carried away homes and vehicles. The homes that remained on their foundations will have to be rebuilt down to the studs, including the kitchens where all appliances had to be trashed and replaced.

Shortly after the water receded and help could be offered, Mercy-USA was on the scene in Floyd county, KY to begin assisting affected families.

We recruited volunteers from the Muslim communities in Louisville and Lexington who formed teams that collected cleaning supplies, baby diapers and other asked for supplies from within their own communities. They also helped us fill a rented truck with small refrigerators/freezers, cooktops, microwaves and other useful small appliances to be distributed to families as they are able to re-enter their homes to clean up and rebuild. Our staff also distributed Visa gift cards to flood survivors. More than once, people asked, "Are you sure there isn't a neighbor who needs this more than us?" This said while stuck in

a shelter or as they were cleaning out three feet of mud from their devastated home. Many of the people we helped are elderly and will need a lot more assistance getting their lives back on track.

On a second trip to the flood affected region our team distributed \$500 Lowes gift cards to vulnerable families attempting to rebuild their homes. With the help of Christian Appalachian Project, a nondenominational charity with deep ties to these rural communities, we were able to reach extremely needy households. One recipient of the gift card, Luecrecia Hicks said, "This \$500 gift card will help repair my bathroom so I can shower again."





Protecting the health of moms and children in Lebanon

The economy in Lebanon has been deteriorating for years but recent negative pressures such as the worldwide pandemic and the war in Ukraine that cut off wheat and oil imports to Lebanon have created a humanitarian crisis. The Lebanese Pound has lost 90% against the US Dollar. According to the World Bank, Lebanon recorded a 332% increase in food prices during the month of June. 75% of the country has fallen into poverty, so imagine the impact on Lebanon's poor, including Palestinian and Syrian refugees.

Mercy-USA, with grant funding from the United Nations Office for the Coordination of Humanitarian Affairs (OCHA), is providing a package of services to support the health and nutritional needs of children and their mothers through six primary health clinics in some of the most poverty stricken parts of Lebanon.

Our community health workers screen and treat children for malnutrition. We also train mothers on best practices for the care and feeding of their children under five. Children from birth to age five who are malnourished are at most risk of stunted growth, slowed cognitive development and worse. Just as importantly, pregnant and lactating women need this screening and support to protect their health as well as the lives of their babies. Mothers are encouraged to breastfeed their infants and given the support they need to successfully nurture their children in an extremely difficult context.



Jannat's Story

One-year-old Jannat was found to be malnourished by Mercy-USA healthcare staff during a visit to the Akka-Akar camp in Lebanon. The poverty in this camp is severe, it lacks sanitation, clean water and is barely livable. In addition to making sure Jannat would receive therapeutic feeding treatment, Mercy-USA community health workers gave her mother advice on proper feeding of the baby in the face of her difficult circumstances. Mothers in the camp were counseled on family planning, breast feeding and strategies for providing healthy diets for growing children despite the challenges they face.
