Clean Water is a Luxury in Somalia

The lack of nearby access to clean, drinkable water in Somalia results in devastating consequences especially for the two most vulnerable population groupswomen and children.

According to UNICEF, only 30% of Somalis have safe access to clean water, and in some parts of the country those statistics are as low as 20%. Cholera brought on by contaminated water and lack of sanitation is endemic and claims the lives of hundreds every year. Severe malnutrition in Somali children is often the result of

diarrhea caused by contaminated water.

Because sourcing water falls mainly on women and girls they face constant threats to their safety while fetching water when the source is far from their home. Whether living in a rural or urban setting, women and girls regularly face threats of violence when forced to travel distances as great as six miles each way for water. In addition to the man-made threats, wildlife such as hyenas, lions and snakes are a real danger in rural areas.

The Rural Water Story in Somalia

Rural Somalis rely on water not only for their own needs but to keep their livestock alive. Past years of devastating drought and civil unrest have decimated many formally successful rural Somali families. Many Somalis are pastoralists where their livestock herd is the key to survival. If the herd shrinks, so do the chances the children will be healthy and able to thrive. Hassan, a father of 13 children, has a story that's typical of rural Somalis. "Before the drought I was a rich man, I had more than 1500 goats but when the drought happened only 370 goats survived from the drought. They were weak and more died of diseases and I was finally left with only 10 goats... Children like Hassan's rely on the milk and meat the goats provide to stay strong and healthy in the harsh bush. The effects of severe drought combined with civil unrest and war have made water into a commodity that few can afford. In rural areas without a well, people and livestock are sharing the same water sources. This leads

to contaminated water, and people, especially the children fall sick from diseases. It's a terrible choice for a father: his herd can contaminate the water source, but if the herd dies, so do his children. Mercy-USA builds wells in rural areas that include a watering trough that allows the livestock to be watered without risk of contamination to the drinking water. In rural areas, a run-off system is installed with the well to collect water for livestock during the rainy season.

Since 1997, Mercy-USA has played a vital role in providing safe drinking water in Somalia, digging and repairing wells. Communities with a combined population of over 600,000 persons are benefiting from this safe water program. As experts in the field of safe water, Mercy-USA is an excellent choice when deciding to contribute toward the continuous benefits a well provides a community for many generations into the future.



Basic Medical Care for Syria's Refugees In Lebanon

Syrian Refugees in Lebanon are stuck between a rock and a hard place as we say in America. They have fled their homes in Syria only to find a less than hospitable welcome in Lebanon. As more than 1.5 million Syrian refugees have flocked into Lebanon-with more than ten thousand still awaiting registration according to the UN Refugee Agency's report on Feb. 3, 2015–tension is high between Lebanon citizens and the burgeoning Syrian Refugee population. Lebanon's already struggling economy is straining with the influx of so many desperate Syrians who have lost almost everything. The poor valley of Wadi Khalid is no exception to this situation, and medical services were already in a poor state before the refugees began coming. To help ease some of the strain on the community, Mercy-USA has been funding a mobile clinic operated by Makassed Charitable Organization that travels four days per

week to villages in Wadi Khalid where local families are hosting Syrian refugees. This modern mobile clinic provides disease-preventing vaccines, preand post-natal care, and regular medical exams. The van travels through the hilly valley and serves all manner of ailments and offers some peace of mind to mothers with newborns, or small children with a cough or cold that won't get better, or to the elderly who need to be seen for routine medical checks.















For almost four years, innocent Syrians have been displaced from their homes in the ongoing deadly conflict. Often the most destitute Syrians flee the fighting and destruction with just the clothes on their backs and what they can carry in their arms.

Winter clothing, blankets to survive the difficult winter and knitting yarn were distributed to thousands of Syrian children and their families throughout the winter, thanks to our generous supporters.





Students Give Back for Safe Water

In addition to being an excellent student, 8th grader Sabria K. has always loved sports. She's a brown belt in tae-kwon-do, a starting forward on her local soccer team, and a starting guard on her school basketball team in Virginia. Last summer, as part of a community service project challenge for her girls' youth group, Sabria developed a plan to support clean water for Africa. With the help of her brother, Sabria launched and managed a neighborhood sportsskills camp for young children. After some research they chose to donate the proceeds of their camp to Mercy-USA to help

The parents of the camp participants were informed in the beginning that the fees would go toward this clean water project, but Sabria was happily surprised when some of the parents donated over and above the camp fees toward the clean water project. Sabria said they chose to dedicate proceeds to a well because it is a "continual charity" that they hope will keep giving benefit to others, and ongoing blessings to those who donate to it, far into the future.

Syrian Americans Send Winter Help

From all over Michigan, Syrian Americans organized campaigns in their communities to gather donations of new and gently used winter jackets and clothing, blankets, diapers, wheelchairs and crutches and coordinated with Mercy-USA to ship a 40-foot container to needy recipients in Syria. The planning began last October and resulted in the well-organized and packed goods being delivered to Syria in January 2015.
